## ANNUAL REPORTS &

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ladies of the Century Club of California:

As presiding officer of your Club, it may be expected that there shall be an exhaustive report of Club affairs; but so many things of a private nature have overtaken me since the adjournment of the Club in May last, that I find myself only able to give you a brief summary of the condition and business affairs of the Club.

On the 15th of October of last year, your presiding officer tendered her resignation to the Board of Directors, and, after many vain attempts to induce her to reconsider her action, I was, on the 20th of the same month, chosen by the Board of Directors, in accordance with Section 3, Article II, of the Constitution, to fill the vacancy caused by her resignation. Not being able to take the chair at once, the First Vice-President presided at two meetings of the Club; consequently, I

did not begin my duties as presiding officer until November 14th, since which time the Club has met thirty-three times, nine of which were for the transaction of business and the consideration of the proposed new Constitution, which was adopted, as you know, at the last meeting in May. By this Constitution it was decided to change the method of electing members, and an Admission Committee of twenty-one was arranged for; also to increase the Club membership to three hundred. These were the two most important sections of the Constitution.

The Board of Directors has held twentytwo meetings—twelve regular meetings and ten special. There has always been a quorum, and nearly always a full Board.

The financial condition of the Club is good, as you have heard from the Treasurer's report. The affairs have been so managed by the Board of Directors and Treasurer that the income has been a trifle over and above expenses. There are fifteen hundred dollars in bank as a reserve fund, and several hundred dollars to draw upon, if necessary.

During the year, two new sections have

been formed—one for practical work, and one for chess and whist.

The Board of Directors decided to have monthly bulletins sent out, to replace the postal cards, thereby saving much labor and some money in the way of postage.

Six new members have been elected; four dropped for non-payment of dues; three resignations, which were accepted with regret; and it is my painful duty to announce the death of two charter members—Mrs. Bugbee and Mrs. McElroy.

Mrs. Severance, of Los Angeles, was elected an honorary member by the Club at large.

Several gifts have been received, which were announced at the time by the chair, and will be properly noticed in the Annual Report.

Three tickets to federated clubs have been issued, and the privileges of the Club have been extended to ten guests. The full number of twenty-five tickets has been issued for the Wednesday meetings.

A most successful reception was given to Miss Anthony and Miss Shaw on Tuesday, May 27th, when about sixty tickets were issued to distinguished guests and members of the Woman's Congress.

We have had the Rev. Haweis, Miss Beatrice Harridan, and Miss Phœbe Cousins as honored guests.

A breakfast was given by the Club in February last, which was a most delightful affair; and it would be of great benefit to the social element of the Club if some such thing could be done each year. The committees having it in charge were very efficient, and contributed greatly to its success.

It is with great pleasure that I extend the thanks of the Club to the Wednesday Committees, who have done such efficient work and given us so much pleasure during the past year.

Special thanks are owed to the chairman of the Committee on Decorations, who has done her work alone, and has made our rooms so beautiful during the last year.

To those who have been in affliction, I extend the sympathy of the Club.

I have to announce the resignation of the Treasurer in May, and the election of Mrs. Whittell by the Board of Directors to take her place.

The question of moving has been discussed, and a committee appointed to look for other quarters, but, up to this time, nothing has been presented which the committee could consider; consequently, the Club must remain in its present quarters another year. Miss Hastings has promised to make some alterations for the Club on her return. Some ventilators have been put in the auditorium, which will make the room more comfortable.

On August 5th, the Practical Section held a meeting, the First Vice-President presiding,—an entertainment complimentary to Mrs. Robert Louis Stevenson.

I tender my thanks to the Club for their generous indorsement of the action of the Board of Directors by my election last spring to serve as your presiding officer for another year.

To the Recording Secretary I owe many thanks for her good work, and for her cheerful assistance and kindly sympathy in my special duties, making them as light as possible wherever and whenever she could. For the year that I have been your presiding officer, I have been sustained by the cordial coöperation of the Board of Directors; and if my administration has been in the least degree successful, the credit is due mainly to their wise and prudent counsel, their earnest work, and loyal devotion to myself, as chief executive officer, and to the good of the Club, which we have been seeking to promote; and, in parting with them, I can only say it is with great regret.

To the incoming Board I make my salutations, and I feel confident that we shall work together in harmony for the greatest good to the greatest number. I feel sure of their earnest coöperation during the coming year.

#### CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT

Mrs. President, Fellow-Members:

There have been ninety letters and seventeen reports sent this year: fifty-three letters and eleven reports received. The discrepancy between the letters sent and received arose either from the fact that the majority of those to whom reports were sent did not respond, except in kind, or that they were answers for papers or pamphlets, which demanded no reply. Taking away the eleven responses for reports, in which it always seemed fitting to include a line of appreciation and camaradarie, the remaining seventynine have been the acknowledgment of courtesies of gifts-the latter not a very great drain upon the Secretary's powers; apprising new members of their election, or the heavier duty of communicating with the sponsors of those less fortunate; regrets for resignations of members; replies to business questions from the General Federation of Women's Clubs, or from whatever source:

welcoming in of new clubs, and giving information in regard to the plan and working of our own.

Then, there has been the monthly résumé for the Cycle; and though but one "passed to print," for that we should feel grateful, it was so much more than our share, for in number the clubs are becoming like Banquo's issue—"the line seems to stretch out to the crack of doom." With one exception,—that of last week,—there have been no letters of condolence this year, the sentiment of the Board being akin to my own,—that, in the shadow of sorrow, its awful sacredness "words but divide and rend."

Looking backward over the year's letters, one of the earliest was in answer to Miss Shinn's work,—or, rather, Part II of it,—"The Psychological Development of a Child." She naïvely says that she thinks "the aunt is the right one"—just near enough, just far enough removed,—"to make and record the scientific observations."

When one remembers that he who has drawn so immortal a picture of Rome under the Emperors—the mighty Gibbon—declared his mother's sister—"a woman of keen intellect and tender heart"—to be "the mother of his mind;" that another, the philosopher and moralist, who furnishes us with the grandest truths to which, unilluminated by Christianity, man has ever attained,—the ardent, the eloquent Seneca;—when one remembers that each of these paid loving homage to the rare character of his mother's sister, when the weight of ancient and modern authority unite, who shall say "the aunt" is not "the right one"?

Bearing the imperishable heritage of the Pilgrim Fathers, their well-braced moral fibre, to be softened later by the finely-tempered traits of those more near, how singularly blessed is she in her "specimen"! And are we not happy?—Shall we not linger and bask a little in the radiance of the thought that it has been left for one of our own number, yet in the flush of youth, to throw the pure, white light of science on that subject of transcendent importance—Child Study? In what society to live, with a child's soul, fresh from God! What patience, knowledge, courage, and honesty, joined to that flexibility

which culture alone can give, have kindled in her that marvelous sympathetic insight! for, "to hear the lark sing, one must be at heaven's gate with the lark."

How well chosen the time, at this, one of the happy moments of humanity, when the intellectual horizon is opening and broadening all around us, when the old order is passing away, and new forces and new lights are finding free passage to shine in upon us! Could there be a fitter moment for ushering in a new science—and such a science, sacred, pregnant with the weal of all coming time?

Not long after, Miss Coolbrith's exquisite poem, with its matchless sympathy, which we all could feel, but *she* alone could express, bore to the family of Celia Thaxter, in the far-away "isle of shoals," our gentle remembrance.

A letter, written in May, referring to one of the many activities of which the Club has recently become the center, has borne such gracious fruit I thought the Club would like to hear it. It was of our first section work. "You ask for some suggestions; this may be of value: Some time since, a number of members formed themselves into an association, to meet an hour-and-a-half, once a week, to study and apply Parliamentary tactics, each in turn to be President two weeks. In the tournaments which followed, the perfect freedom of these members from embarrassment, the admirable temper of their coat-of-mail,-wrought from links forged in Roberts' Manual,-the intrepidity and ease with which they bore themselves as they swooped down upon one another, their skill and address when 'put to't,' the ready thrust and as ready parry, - all attest its invaluable discipline; while the good-humored laugh which followed the hasty withdrawal of some discomfited knight, yelept Third Amendment, was a suggestive lesson in the exercise of that peerless club quality, toleration; for as the God-like Dan once said, 'To do anything in this world, one must learn to take blows as well as to give 'em.' It took us six years to reach this Parliamentary Assembly. May our 'footprints' aid you! And for your venture, whatever form it may take, -- social, literary, philanthropic, -- will you feel the influence of that bow of promise which to-day we draw above you; and, in the name of the whole Century Club, 'take from my lips the wish for happy years!' ''

Before long, a more than warm-hearted response, and the assurance that *their* Parliamentary Assembly was going at full tilt.

The other two sections—Practical Aims and Whist and Chess—have been formed so lately that of them there has been no opportunity to write; but the many shining names which gleam upon their roll-call give earnest of a radiant future.

In the later spring, some correspondence—half-a-dozen letters—with Eastern clubs, in regard to suggestions for social days. Five responses, the outgrowth of this, the Social Committee of next year may weave for you into something "new and strange."

Now let us balance the ledger and close up the account. We are "seven times one to-day." Can we help exulting a little as we look back upon our early days at the misgivings, the mistrust, the shadowy, half-defined aims before we had unified our thoughts or crystalized into being, and then at our Club of to-day, every session an in-

creasing source of entertainment, instruction, pleasure, deepening, in enthusiastic moments, to positive joy, as, under the influence of some soul-stirring sentiment, we are lifted and borne gloriously beyond ourselves, up into that blue ether, where we can feel, with Robert Browning, that

"This world means intensely, and means good."

"For a moment?" Yes, only for a moment, but *in* that moment we had a glimpse from Pisgah, and all our lives should be richer and better therefor.

These are the rare moments; for the others—if Jean Ingelow had n't stolen my thoughts before 1 was born—I should say,

"Yet, since we are not grand,—
Oh, not at all; and as for cleverness,
That may be, or may not be;—it is well
For us to be as happy as we can."

Yes, that is it: let us all try to be as happy as we can; and the contact with the powers of others, which calls forth new powers in ourselves, and the spirit of comradeship—the sweet, human fellowship—will blossom

out into many a burning word, into many a gracious deed, so true is it

"We rise to God on the wings of love to man."

Before closing, a word of greeting to the incoming Secretary. Those gifted in *chiaro-oscuro*, painters tell us, that to the *background* no less than to the colors which glow upon the canvas does the picture owe its life, meaning, beauty. Then is not the incoming Secretary already deeply in my debt for having prepared a dusky background, upon which she shall shine?

And have there been no mistakes? I hope so; else of what are we to rear that ladder—"built of faults, corrected?"—by which we're all "to climb to heaven"?
