ANNUAL REPORTS.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

Ladies of the Century Club of California:

One year ago to-day, at the beginning of the fifth year of our existence, we assembled here, quite uncertain as to our future. We had passed a crisis. Was the next step in our life to be backward or forward? What would the new administration do, or attempt to do? On that day we called to mind Tennyson's beautiful lines—

“Love took up the harp of life and smote on all its chords
with might,
Smote the chord of self that trembling passed in music
out of sight.”

By these lines we resolved to set the keynote of our year. We resolved to make each self a responsive part of the whole, to make every hour worthy of enjoyment, and to enjoy it. We have held closely to our resolution. A

spirit of broad justice has prevailed; individualities have been sunk in the general good; and, now, at the close of the year, it is an honor and a pleasure to review the points of our steadfast prosperity.

Month to month we have grown; and the growth has been strong and symmetrical. The outgoing administration has sought, first of all, to improve our methods of dealing, one with another. How much it has accomplished by way of establishing this first great point of progress you are to be the judges.

Few clubs attempt so many lines of work as we attempt. Our broad plan of culture necessitates able leaders in the various departments, leaders with the judgment and tact to bring out the best that there is in us, and to supplement our best by the best to be drawn from the outside. Of the thirty-two papers read during the year, seventeen have been by women, and fourteen by Club members. Decided improvement is noticeable in the willingness of our members to speak. We are no longer overawed by the distinguished speakers not of our membership. We seem to say with Emerson,

“Instead of feeling a poverty when we encounter a great man, let us treat the new comer like a traveling geologist who passes through our estate and shows us good slate, or limestone, or anthracite in our brush pasture.”

The geologist passing through our estate has shown us something more precious than limestone or anthracite,—the bright, clean gold that has glistened in the after discussions.

We have held the usual thirty-five regular meetings of the Club, and four business and special meetings.

Our treasury is in good condition.

The hospitality of the Club has been extended, for a month and longer, to twenty-three ladies, members of other clubs.

Thirty cards of introduction to the General Federation of Women's Clubs have been issued to our members.

A delegate was sent to the General Federation of Clubs; also an exhibit to the General Federation of Clubs,—a Historical Sketch and a copy of our Constitution and By Laws. We learn from strangers, as well as from our own members, that our exhibit excited universal admiration.

We have opened our Club House for seven evening lectures during the year. This seems to have been a pleasant innovation, as the lectures were all well attended.

A Librarian has been appointed to care for our library.

A class in Physical Culture has been formed from the Club.

We have been the recipients of many beautiful gifts from members as well as from several of our guests, among which are 125 souvenir spoons.

We have elected five new members, and accepted three resignations.

To add to the comfort of our non-resident members, we have prepared, and furnished comfortably, one of our best rooms and have placed it at their disposal. The same room has been used as a Director's room. We lessened our income by this means, but added materially to the convenience of our members.

A second room was vacated in June, and has remained vacant.

Two Women's Clubs have the use of our rooms at stated times, The Pacific Coast

Alumni and The Women's Medical Association of the Pacific Coast.

Of the unflagging faithfulness of my fellow-workers on the Board, too much cannot be said. They have been most energetic and patient. There has never failed to be a quorum at either a regular or a special meeting, and there have been twenty meetings.

The onerous duties and the accurate performance of them by the Treasurer and the Recording Secretary call for special notice. In neither case, during the entire year, has it been found necessary to make a correction.

Under the skilful guidance of the Committee on Art and Literature, we have travelled, in company with gifted men and women, from the land of the Ancient Hebrews through Greece and Rome to France and to the homeland of England.

The Committee on Practical Questions of the Day has given us solid food for thought and a variety of entertainment.

The Committee on Science and Education has put us deeply in its debt. Learning and eloquence have been employed in the orderly development of the relations of woman to the

many intricate conditions and activities of life. The excellent work of this committee is to be largely credited to the ability and loyalty of its gifted chairman. Under its auspices the course of lectures on connected topics was a successful departure, as has been evidenced by the large attendance and the many requests for visitors' tickets; the requests having, several times, exceeded the generous number allowed, twenty-five for each day.

As for the Committee on Music, surely in speaking of it we can use only words of warmest commendation. This committee has more than its share of difficulty to surmount. In every instance the difficulty has been surmounted; and none of the memories of the year past are pleasanter than those of the days when music has been the ruling power.

The Committee on Formal Debate has achieved the usual brilliant success, our debates having been invariably interesting and instructive.

The Committee on Social Entertainment has added to the regular socials four charming receptions: those to Mr. James Whitcomb Riley, to the first President of the Club, our beloved

Mrs. Hearst, the reception to gentlemen, and, fourth and last, our never-to-be-forgotten morning with the great artist, Ellen Terry.

The regular social days on the fourth Wednesday of the month have proved thoroughly delightful. We are much beholden to the chairman and her committee for them; not least for many happy strains of music and recitation waked unexpectedly on these occasions. Memorable among the happy surprises are the exhibition of the best wood engraving of this country, and the pleasant talk on them, by Mrs. Comstock of Stanford University, and the remarkable reading of *Andrea del Sarto* by Miss Wickham of New York. It was also under the auspices of the Social Committee that we enjoyed the lovely presentation of *Psyche*.

This committee has been ably seconded by the Refreshment Committee, which deserves special mention. Our refreshments, more elaborate than usual, have been delightfully served; and, owing to the admirable management, with a light demand upon our treasury.

The House Committee has made no changes; its good work is self-evident.

The Committee on Decoration has performed with exquisite taste its most important part, that of enveloping us in an atmosphere of beauty.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

Ladies of the Century Club of California :

The work of the Corresponding Secretary during the present year remains substantially the same as during the last preceding, except that perhaps the number of letters written was somewhat larger. This was partly due to the interest awakened by the proposed exhibit at the World's Fair in Chicago and the communications in regard to this received from Mrs. Charlotte Emerson Brown, President of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and from Mrs. Fanny Purdy Palmer, Chairman of the Committee on Exhibit at the World's Fair. In this connection, your Secretary is happy to state that nothing quite like our exhibit, either for beauty of design or elegance of workmanship, was seen there, although the reports from sister clubs were artistic and in good taste, and full of interesting data. Let us congratulate ourselves that we belong to one of the great fraternities of *women* whose existence and work

were so fittingly indicated by the "Organization Room" of the Woman's Building. The finger of Time seemed to point to this space more significantly even than elsewhere in this great display of the work of nations.

During the last half year an investigation was made by our Club into the plans pursued by other clubs in erecting suitable Club buildings. For this purpose, letters were written to nine sister clubs, and answers received—the information contained in those from Philadelphia and Indianapolis being specially desirable.

The home letters this year have consisted of those of condolence, of instructions to Delegates, or of communications with members for whatever purpose. In regard to the first, we could wish that the pen of the writer might have been inspired by a sympathy felt to be vital; while for the last, the memory of many kindly messages linger with us, and we can only hope for our successor that the current of Club life will run as smoothly in the coming years as it has in that just passed.
