PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ladies of the Century Club of California:

It becomes my duty, as presiding officer of your Club, to present a brief report of its business affairs for the past year. There have been held during the year thirty regular meetings, seven business meetings, and two special meetings, and with one exception the President has occupied the chair. The Board of Directors has held eighteen meetings, the President presiding at each, excepting once. A full attendance of members was present, exceeding at every meeting the required quorum.

The financial condition of the Club is good, and as the Club has heard from the Treasurer's report, there are several hundred dollars to its credit in excess of last year.

A former President in her report deprecates the fact that of eighty-eight individuals contributing to the instruction and pleasure of

the Club during the year of her administration, only eighteen or twenty per cent, were Club members. It is pleasant to note, that of one hundred and two persons by whom we have been entertained during the past year, nearly forty per cent were Club members. This percentage includes only the leaders on Formal Debate days.

An Admission Committee was elected at the beginning of this year, thereby taking the duty of electing members from the Directory. So far the work of that committee has been satisfactory. Eighteen new members have been added to the Club; two resignations have been recorded. At the close of the eighth year of the Club, the membership list numbers two hundred, which was the limit until one year ago, when the Club amended the Constitution, providing for a membership of three hundred.

The monthly bulletin, which during the past year has been substituted for the postals formerly issued each month for notifying members of the meetings, has proved most satisfactory. This has been a vast saving of the expense and labor attendant upon issuing

eight to ten thousand postals, sent out by the secretaries and the committees in former years. Two hundred postals a month, instead of a thousand or twelve hundred! The members will realize the saving in expense, to say nothing of the economy of the labor.

The Club is to be congratulated in having continued to live (with some struggling, it must be admitted,) under an unamended Constitution. This period of relaxation has certainly been earned, when one remembers that fourteen meetings were occupied in the task of amending the Constitution last year.

The Parliamentary Section has met every Friday morning during the year, with always more than a quorum, and has done good work. No report has come from the Practical Section, or from the Whist Sections. The Parliamentary Section gave a breakfast, at which there were no guests. The thanks of the Club are extended to the committees who have made such ample provision for its entertainment in Art, Literature, Science, Oratory, Music, and the Practical Questions of the Day. Distinguished people, temporarily in our midst, have given the Club of

their best. The regular Wednesdays, the Social and the Music Days, especially the last two, have been attended to the full extent of the constitutional limit. The twenty-five visitors' tickets have been issued for every Wednesday. The freedom of the Club has been extended to twenty members of other clubs visiting in this city, and three federation tickets have been issued to members going East. The Club has entertained its friends twice during the year, by a New-Year reception at the Club-house, and a breakfast at the Palace Hotel. The gifts of the year have been numerous, both useful and ornamental, and will be noted in their proper place in the report of the year. Mrs. Geo. Castle and Mrs. F. M. Swanzy, of Honolulu, guests of the Club, sent gifts, showing their appreciation of the courtesy extended them by the Century Club during their visit to this city.

There has been nothing done in the way of renewing the lease of this house, as there is a rumor to the effect that Miss Hastings is coming to San Francisco to make the requisite alterations, and to lease it to the Club for a term of years.

Special thanks are due to the chairman of the Refreshment Committee, for her faithful service in presiding at the tea-table for two years on Wednesday afternoons; also, to the chairman of the Committee on Decorations, for making the rooms so beautiful with flowers, a service requiring much thought and a great deal of labor.

To the Board of Directors the President extends her heartfelt thanks, for their unflinching attendance, and for the unvarying courtesy and consideration shown her during this last year.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT

SEPTEMBER 4, 1895, TO SEPTEMBER 2, 1896

It having been my privilege during the past year to act as Corresponding Secretary, the no less pleasant duty now becomes mine of laying before you a general view of the twelvemonth's experience.

And since the true essence of all things is in idea rather than in number, an attempt will be made to group vital points without regard to numericals. Then, too, pursuit of the same object is more or less of a bond, and the many Club reports, letters, and other communications, which have found their way to the study-table since last September, merit something beside cataloguing.

The reports are of various kinds, from the dainty white-and-gold and white-and-black year-books of the æsthetic and literary clubs, to the plain businesslike pamphlets of larger and more catholic organizations. Daintiness is, happily, no bar to strength;

and the booklets reveal a determined purpose, and show how potent is that love of the beautiful and ideal which finds expression even amid the most untoward surroundings. Many of these tiny volumes come from the very outskirts of our country, where not ease, but labor, alternates with study; thus proving woman's determination to preserve the bloom of cultivated thought amid the ruder growths of primitive life.

A larger scope and more general plan is outlined in the latter reports specified. "Let us be such as help the life of the future," runs the motto of the Cincinnati Woman's Club, using Zoroaster's thought to further ends little dreamed of in his philosophy. For, beside able departments of literature, art, music, and household economics, its report presents, in the department of philanthropy and social science, a course of study on the labor problem, which neither man nor woman could pursue faithfully without becoming enlarged in vision and in aim.

Added to the departments already mentioned, are those of current topics, and civics, — the whole offering equal opportunity to the

student of man, and to the student of man's work.

Another able report is that of the Arundell Club, of Baltimore. Though a veritable infant, knowing but one year of life, it is an organization built upon so firm and broad a base that nothing can hinder its growth and prosperity. Listen for a moment, while the President, Miss Elizabeth T. King, speaks: "The Arundell Club was organized a little more than a year ago with thirty-three members. It now numbers two hundred and sixty-three, is within thirty-seven of its limit, and looks forward to that aim of all clubs—a waiting-list. . . . The life which has gone on in our club-house is of a varied character. Public meetings, sectional study, committees for public work, social entertainments, musicales, field days, and, not least of all, quiet hours spent by members over the periodicals, have all contributed to form the complicated organization which women are pleased to call a club, but which means much more, if considered from a sociological standpoint."

Accompanying the report is a programme of section meetings, where subjects were con-

sidered which cover much of the field of modern study, and seem well adapted to club needs.

A strong plea, too, is made for an abundance of social spirit, and for a general living up to Stevenson's gospel of happiness.

Take them for all in all, these reports declare nothing more strongly than that women are steadily gaining in a breadth of character which declares for large tolerance and high intents. Nor do the letters received in any way lessen this impression; on the contrary, they go far to strengthen it. Many are full of inquiry as to the best means of securing the greatest good in club work; others beg suggestions for avoidance of petrifying routine, and still others ask for co-operation in some undertaking bearing upon the general good of a community. To such a group belongs the communication from Mrs. Alice C. Baird, President of the Woman's Book Club, of Washington. This little body took upon itself to found the Everett Public Library by requesting a gift of one volume (prose, poetry, or whatever the giver might will) from each of the federated clubs.

It afforded your executive board only pleasure to answer such a suit affirmatively, and also to add some encouraging words. The acknowledgment was couched in warmly appreciative terms, and its writer subjoined the intelligence that eight hundred volumes had already found their way to the library, and that when there were a thousand it would be opened to the public.

Of a more personal nature is a letter from our distinguished honorary member, Julia Ward Howe. It bears many messages of friendship and good-will, and contains the pleasing intelligence that Mrs. William Reding, an absentee from our ranks, living at Brookline, Mass., has been elected a member of the New England Woman's Club, which is so fortunate as to have Mrs. Howe for President.

Another letter freighted with kindly messages is that of Mary Clay Knapp, who writes: "The interests of the Century Club will ever seem personal to me through the courtesy so gracefully extended while a stranger in a strange city, and through the darkest hours of my life."

So far, indeed, does Mrs. Knapp's enthusiasm carry her, that she hopes some time to have a winter home in San Francisco.

Just a touch of masculine spice was sifted into the general correspondence through a letter from Mr. Parris, of the Barnard Club of New York, and one from Mr. Willbur Reaser.

Mr. Parris's letter introduced Mrs. Sophia Mapes Tolles. Those who have had the pleasure of meeting her, and being charmed by her wisdom and goodness of heart, will, I know, add their thanks to mine.

Mr. Reaser's communication was a request for privilege to deliver a course of lectures, under Century Club auspices. All undertakings of this kind being strictly forbidden in by-laws, section fifth, the obedient "No" went forth.

Letters written with extreme regret were those accepting the resignation of Mrs. S. K. Lothrop, and of Miss Geraldine Bonner. In both cases, lack of time to attend the sessions of the Club rendered resignation necessary.

A more gracious task was the acknowledgment of gifts and courtesies from kindred organizations like Sorosis, and from individual

members to the whole Club body. "In the Redwoods," Sorosis' little publication was received with much pleasure, and a cordial wish extended for success in every such good work.

From individual members, the gifts have ranged through a long list of things necessary and ornamental. All have their beauty and value, and one, presented by Mrs. James Bunnell, has an especial significance. It is, as you know, a cast from a bas-relief of the balustrade of the Temple of Wingless Victory at Athens, and bears the title, "Victory loosing her sandal." Its particular significance lies in the fact that the Greeks held it not only to typify success in battle, but in any active enterprise. The loosing of the sandal was the last act necessary to dispatch, and might be said to contain a valuable suggestion. In the lives of many clubs, as of many individuals, there comes a time, when, by loosing the old and worn-out sandals of habit, new power is gained to more swiftly and surely move along the steep path of development. That such an hour will come to this Club is not among the absolute im-

probabilities; and when it shall, may the Club loose its sandals, keep its heart steady, and not, like all the Victories—even that superb figure of Samothrace,—lose its head.
